

VERNON GLEN BEAN

Vernon was born on December 17, 1929, in Industry Maine. Son of Olon and Beulah (Ellis) Bean. He graduated from Flagstaff High School in the class of 1947. Vern proudly served his country in the U.S Army, during the Korean Conflict. On February 18, 1956, he married Joan Nile in Stratton and together, they shared four sons. Vern born May 25, 1958, Ricky born September 2, 1960 (gave his life in an Air Force B1 Bomber crash), Glen born February 22, 1968, and Nathan born January 27, 1971. All boys were born in Farmington Maine. Joan predeceased Vernon in death on October 13, 2019.



Over the years, Vern worked for the Eustis Telephone Company (1948-1949), Oquossoc Light and Power (1950), and the Rangeley Power Company (1960). In 1976, CMP purchased Rangeley Power Company and he worked as the Area Representative until his retirement from CMP in 1991. In the following years, Vern was instrumental in organizing the transition of the private water company to a town entity in Rangeley. He served on the Board of Trustees and as Superintendent for the Rangeley Water District, retiring (again) after 26 years, in 2017. The road that the water district offices are located on was renamed to Vernon Bean Way in his honor.

Vern was a member of Mount Bigelow Lodge #202 A.F & A.M., Kora Shrine, 32th Degree Scottish Rites and York Rites Masonic organizations, the American Legion, the Forty and Eight, and was a long-time member of the Stratton/Eustis Lions Club. Vern enjoyed fishing, hunting, auctions, and he was a licensed pyrotechnician for years. In his later years, he enjoyed doing jigsaw puzzles and watching NASCAR.

Dear Friends:

I am deeply honored to serve the people of Maine in the U.S. Senate, and I welcome this opportunity to share some of the areas I have been working on over the past year.

The ongoing COVID-19 pandemic continues to pose enormous challenges for our state and our country. When the pandemic began, I co-authored the Paycheck Protection Program that helped small businesses remain afloat and keep their employees paid. In Maine, our small businesses received more than 47,000 forgivable loans totaling \$3.2 billion. I also led efforts to provide relief for loggers, lobstermen, and bus companies.

In addition, I helped secure \$700 million to assist Maine's overwhelmed hospitals and nursing homes, and a new law I led prevented Medicare payment cuts to help further ease the financial strain on our hospitals. I also urged the CDC to update its recommendations so that our students and teachers could safely return to their classrooms, and I pressed the Administration to end the closure of the U.S.-Canada border.

While addressing the pandemic has been a major focus, I've also worked hard to ensure Maine's other needs are met. A group of 10 Senators, of which I was a part, negotiated the landmark bipartisan infrastructure bill that was signed into law in November. I co-authored the section of the bill that will provide Maine with as much as \$300 million to expand high-speed internet in rural and underserved areas.

Soaring inflation is another crisis, particularly when it comes to the cost of heating oil. I have strongly supported federal programs that help Maine families stay warm. In November, Maine was awarded \$35 million to help low-income Mainers pay their energy bills. And the bipartisan infrastructure bill included \$3.5 billion to help families make energy efficiency improvements that would permanently lower their heating costs.

As a senior member of the Appropriations Committee, I have supported investments in Maine's communities. This year's funding bills include \$265 million I championed for 106 projects across Maine. These projects would help create jobs, improve workforce training, address the opioid crisis, and increase access to childcare and health care services. In addition, I worked to reverse proposed cuts to our Navy in order to help protect America and keep the skilled workers at Bath Iron Works on the job. The bills also include \$475 million for the construction of a new dry dock at Maine's Portsmouth Naval Shipyard that will allow the Navy to continue to carry out its submarine missions. I will keep working to get these important bills enacted.

No one works harder than the people of Maine, and this year I honored that work ethic when I cast my 8,000th consecutive vote, becoming the only Senator in history to do so without ever having missed a roll call vote. The Lugar Center at Georgetown University once again ranked me as the most bipartisan Senator for the eighth year in a row.

In the New Year, I will keep working to solve problems and make life better for the people of Maine and America. May 2022 be a happy, healthy, and successful one for you, your family, and our state.

Dear Friends,

On the heels of 2020's challenges, 2021 brought us both amazing progress and frustrating setbacks. The incredible rollout of several effective, FDA approved COVID-19 vaccines helped reduce the risks of this deadly pandemic – but vaccine hesitancy, combined with the dangers of new variants, have prolonged this crisis and created new risks for Maine people. The challenges raised tension levels to boiling points during the fallout of the 2020 presidential election and the January 6th Capitol attack. But despite that, Congress was able to deliver for a nation gripped by an unprecedented pandemic. As we reflect back on the year, we see the important action that will make a difference for Maine people – as well as work still unfinished.

As COVID-19 continued to impact communities across our state and the country, Congress's first priority this year was to confront the pandemic's health threats and economic toll. We immediately got to work on the American Rescue Plan, crafting an emergency bill to meet the moment and get our nation back on stable footing. The legislation delivered essential support to businesses facing crises, households in need, and the medical professionals on the front lines of this fight. The funds helped get vaccine shots in arms, while also confronting the damage done to our economy. All told, the American Rescue Plan is bringing billions of dollars to Maine, helping the state continue to push through this crisis and bounce back stronger than ever.

After passing the American Rescue Plan, Congress turned its attention to a longstanding but unfulfilled priority: infrastructure. Through hard work and compromise, both parties came together to pass a bipartisan bill that finally addresses key infrastructure needs. For Maine people, the bill means an estimated \$1.5 billion to repair crumbling roads and out-of-date bridges, \$390 million to improve access to clean drinking water, and more. I am most excited about the significant funding for broadband - because, as we have seen during the pandemic, broadband is a necessity to succeed in the 21st century economy. The historic investments in the bipartisan infrastructure bill, combined with additional funding I pushed for in the American Rescue Plan, will bring an estimated \$400 million for broadband home to Maine. These funds will be nothing short of transformational, creating new opportunities across our state.

These two bills have made and will continue to make a real difference for Maine people, helping to both address the challenges of COVID-19 and lay a foundation for long-term success. I am proud of what we've accomplished this year – but I know there is still a lot of work to do and that the road ahead is challenging. Even still, I am filled with optimism because I know the true nature of our citizens, though challenged, has not changed. Despite every hardship, people in towns and communities have stepped up with strong local leadership, a willingness to help, and a Maine 'neighborhood' spirit. It is why I truly believe we can and will get through anything together. Mary and I wish you a happy, healthy, and safe 2022.

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you safe and well. It remains a privilege to represent you in Congress, and I appreciate the opportunity to update you on what I have been working on for the people of the Second Congressional District.

This year, our small businesses, workers and families, hospitals, states, and towns continued to face challenges related to the coronavirus pandemic. COVID-19 has been a serious threat to public health and our economy that requires a comprehensive, ongoing response. While we are not yet out of the woods, there is a light at the end of the tunnel. Still, I know there are many Mainers who will continue to need assistance getting through this pandemic. I am committed to making sure our communities' most urgent needs are met to get our economy back on track.

One thing I am particularly proud of this year is that Democrats, Republicans, and the Biden Administration worked together to pass the bipartisan *Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act*, which will make a once-in-ageneration investment in our nation's infrastructure and support Maine jobs. This bill will bring \$1.3 billion to Maine for highways and \$225 million for bridge replacement and repairs, as well as \$234 million to improve public transportation options. It will also allocate over \$100 million to help provide broadband access to the 42,000 Mainers currently without it and make 310,000 Mainers eligible for the Affordable Connectivity Benefit to help families pay for internet access. Crucially, it will also provide Maine with \$390 million to combat Maine's historically high rates of lead poisoning by replacing lead pipes and allowing Maine families access to clean drinking water.

Another one of my priorities in Congress is protecting Maine jobs. For one, shipbuilders at Bath Iron Works are a vital part of our economy, and the ships they build are critical to our national security. Throughout 2021, I led the Maine congressional delegation in pushing back against the Biden Administration's proposed decrease in DDG-51 shipbuilding, a proposal that would have had serious consequences for the shipbuilding workforce at BIW, one of the two shipyards that produces these destroyers, and American naval capabilities around the world. We fought successfully to include authorization for construction of three new DDG-51 destroyers in the final National Defense Authorization Act. I will continue to work hard with my colleagues on the House Armed Services Committee to ensure that we protect our national security and shipbuilding jobs in Maine.

My most meaningful work in Congress continues to be providing direct assistance to Mainers. My staff and I stand ready to serve you. Dear Friends & Neighbors:

As the new year continues to unfold, I want to once again thank the good people of Rangeley for allowing me the opportunity to serve them at the State House. Challenges caused by the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic still make daily headlines, while policymakers at all levels of government seek to restore some sense of normalcy by exploring available options to preserve constituents' overall wellbeing. Maine's economy appears to be weathering these unprecedented times, seeing that State revenue forecasters project Maine will collect \$822 million more than initially expected during the current two-year budget cycle ending in mid-2023 -- an increase of nearly 10 percent.

The Second Regular Session of the 130th Maine Legislature began January 5, 2022, and statutory adjournment is set for April 20, 2022. Legislators are working to finalize the various bills carried over from the First Regular and First Special Sessions, at the same time as taking into consideration new legislation deemed to be emergency in nature, dealing with budgetary matters, proposals from the Governor, initiatives submitted pursuant to statute, legislation submitted pursuant to authorized studies, and legislation submitted by direct initiative petition of the electors. Much of this business is being conducted virtually, so I encourage you to monitor the Legislature's Web site if you have an interest in following proceedings.

As we enter 2022, I am happy to report that the town of Rangeley is benefitting from the many services provided by the Sheriff's Office.

First our Patrol Division has a team of deputies whose sole purpose is to provide the best possible service available. They are responsive and professional; their main priorities continue to be the protection of our citizen's personal safety and their property ever mindful of their civil liberties. We continue to patrol and maintain high visibility in the four season playground of Rangeley. With the reopening of Saddleback Mountain Resort, we have seen a resurgence of activity and request for all types of service in the area. We have been a force multiplier for several years, augmenting the Rangeley Police Department when they cannot provide service. Two of our most popular programs within patrol is our Elder Check program which continues to be successful and has provided comfort to the seniors who participate in it. Also, our Building Check program, which provides security to unoccupied residences, businesses and town property.

Our Civil Deputy is always in the area reaching out to citizens providing services from court.

Our Detention Center provides the best possible services available to a small county by identifying inmates who suffer from addiction and or some type of mental health issue. Once identified, they are given access to appropriate programs that will help them with their condition, which hopefully reduces recidivism.

Our Criminal Investigation Division team of investigators are busy all the time working on major crimes such as sex crimes, burglaries/theft, online fraud, drug crimes and domestic abuse. I wish I could give you more detail about the amount of work our drug investigators are involved with, however given the nature of the business, let us just say that our investigators not only are charging violators here, but also provide intelligence to other agencies that allow them to make arrests in their jurisdictions.

Board of Selectmen

Greetings to the Citizens of the Town of Rangeley,

First let me thank my fellow board members for their hard work and dedication: Vice Chairman Shelly Lowell, Stephen Philbrick, Ethan Shaffer and a welcome aboard to Ethna Thompson who was newly elected in June 2021. It's a pleasure to work with this group who cares so much for this Town and it's future. They bring varied perspectives to the table which results in good discussion and decision making.

We continued to meet via Zoom during the months of moderate to high Covid-19 transmission, and though not an ideal way to conduct business, a lot was accomplished, and I'll hit the highlights.

The Town of Rangeley Comprehensive Plan continues to direct our priorities and we saw the completion of the sidewalk on Main Street up to the Dallas Hill Road Scenic Overlook. This was one of the projects identified in the Plan. This sidewalk extension was 75% funded by a State of Maine Grant. We've seen this sidewalk used year-round and a relief to see that folks have another safe walking route along Route 4. The Board has formed the new Comprehensive Plan Implementation Committee. This committee will review the progress made with meeting the goals identified in the Plan and what's left to do. If you are interested in participating, we have 3 openings left-please complete a Request for Appointment form and submit it to the Town Office.

The Selectmen were presented with proposed changes to Chapter 38 of the Town Code and we dedicated dozens of hours, holding public workshops, reviewing these changes and this work will continue until revisions are ready to present to the Town residents for vote. This Chapter covers some key topics such as the Land Use Table, lighting, signs, setbacks, and shoreland zone changes, to name a few. Revisions to this Chapter need to be reviewed carefully, as they can affect many aspects of living in Rangeley. We would encourage everyone to review Chapter 38 with us and provide feedback as these changes will affect many aspects of land use.

Policy development for the Town of Rangeley Tax Increment Financing (TIF) was another board focus. Last year, voters narrowly approved the establishment of downtown tax increment financing districts in Rangeley and Oquossoc. For all new structures or improvements made on properties within the Districts, the tax revenue realized is set aside in a TIF account to be spent on future Town projects or other developments which must fit specific criteria allowed by the State of Maine. The Selectmen want to be sure the voters have a role in approving TIF projects and how these funds are allocated, which isn't usually the case in other towns' policies related to their TIF accounts.

The **biggest** news is the receipt of a multimillion-dollar grant to cover the cost of bringing fiber optic cable to the Town of Rangeley and the surrounding Plantations. This years-long effort with the Municipal Broadband Delegates Group, the Rangeley Region Economic Development Committee, Connect Maine Authority and Consolidated Communications representatives will result in competitively priced high-speed internet to each household and business who want the service. The Board of Selectmen wish to also recognize our Town Manager Joe Roach for the many hours he put into this project.

The Board also wants to thank Joe for his continued hard work and dedication to the Town of Rangeley. Of special note is the time and effort Joe put in to recover almost \$750,000 the town paid out of our general fund in 2019 and 2020 for work done on the airport runway project where we were never reimbursed. Once Joe discovered this issue, which occurred prior to his arrival as Town Manager, he advocated endlessly for the outcome that was best for the Town.

In closing the Board also wants to express our gratitude to those residents who devote time on our Town Boards and Committees. Thank you for the time you take out of your lives to contribute to the workings of our town. We wish to also express our deep gratitude to our first responders whose dedication to public service and the needs of our community are truly appreciated.

The Planning Department oversees land use planning in Rangeley and is responsible for code enforcement, building inspection, and E911 addressing. The Department provides staff support to the Planning Board, Zoning Board of Appeals, and Ordinance Committee. It also maintains records on property lots in the Town, possibly to include: building permits, plumbing permits, conditional use permits, subdivisions, or other related documents.

This includes Chapter 38, zoning ordinances, Chapter 12, mooring ordinance, and the beginning researching of new ordinances to address innovations happening in the construction and development industries. There are vacancies on the Zoning Board of Appeals and Ordinance Committee. Please consider serving on one of these boards as it allows an opportunity to provide the community with assistance in realizing development plans as well as providing insight for ordinances in progress. Public attendance is always welcome for any board.

Permits are required for most building projects, whether they be locally or state mandated. In general, a permit is not needed for normal maintenance repairs or to replace cosmetic materials including roofing, siding, or windows and doors (within the existing opening). Please contact the Code Enforcement Office with any relevant questions before commencing work.

Appointments are encouraged to guarantee a meeting to discuss projects and answer any questions.

Assessor's Report

Assessor's Report

We have enjoyed serving the Town of Rangeley as its Assessor/Assessor Agents over the last year. We are available at the Town Office two days per week. Please call the office to schedule an appointment. Annually, the Assessor's Office reviews valuations and adjust the valuations that include any additions and deletions. We are also responsible for maintaining accurate records of property ownership. Part of the assessment process includes conducting an annual "ratio study", which compares the actual selling price of property to assessments. The most recent study conducted for the state valuation purposes indicated the assessed values, on average, to be at approximately 100% of market value.

PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTIONS AND PROPERTY TAX RELIEF

HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION

Most homeowners whose principal residence is in Maine are entitled up to a \$25,000 reduction in valuation (adjusted by the community's ratio of valuation to actual market sales). To qualify, homeowners must fill out a simple form declaring their Rangeley property as their principal residence by April 1 in the tax year claimed. Once the application is filed, the exemption remains until the owner sells or changes their place of residence. Forms are available in the Assessor's Office.

VETERANS EXEMPTION

Any person who was in active service in the armed forces of the United States during a federally recognized war campaign period and, if discharged or retired under honorable conditions, may be eligible for a partial exemption from taxes on their primary residence.

The Veteran must have reached age 62 or must be receiving a pension or compensation from the United States Government for total disability, either service or non-service connected.

RECOGNIZED WAR PERIODS

World War I - April 6, 1917 through November 11, 1918;

World War I - (service in Russia) - April 6, 1917 through March 31, 1920;

World War II - December 7, 1941 through December 31, 1946;

Korean Conflict - June 27, 1950 through January 31, 1955;

Vietnam Era – February 28, 1961 through May 7, 1975. For the period, February 28, 1961 through August 4, 1964, federal law restricts the definition of the Vietnam Era war period to relating only to veterans who served in the Republic of Vietnam.

Persian Gulf War – August 2, 1990 to the date that the U.S. Government recognizes as the end of the Persian Gulf War. This period also includes Operation Enduring Freedom, Operation Iraqi Freedom, and Operation New Dawn.

OTHER RECOGNIZED SERVICE PERIODS

February 28, 1961 through August 4, 1964 (Maine property tax exemption applies to all veterans who served during February 28, 1961 through May 7, 1975, regardless of where they served);

August 24, 1982 through July 31, 1984; and December 20, 1989 through January 31, 1990.

Applications forms can be obtained in the Assessor's Office and must be filed with military discharge documentation on or before April 1st of the year it will go into effect.

BLIND EXEMPTION

Residents of Rangeley who are certified to be legally blind by their eye care professional are eligible for a partial exemption from taxes on their primary residence in the town.

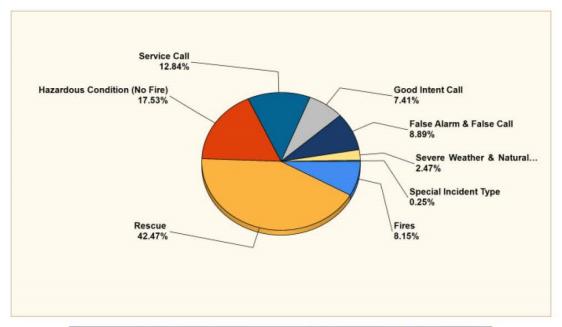
This year Rangeley Fire Rescue responded to 405 calls for service and conducted 998 hours of training.

Dear Citizens of Rangeley and Oquossoc,

In 2021, your police department responded to or initiated over 3400 calls for service.

Our call numbers would have increased significantly had we been fully staffed with three full-time officers. Since one of our officers took a position with the Oxford County Sheriff's Department in May 2021, we have been operating at 66% staffing capacity.

The bulk of our services are "community-focused"; centered on meaningful community contacts, maintaining high visibility, and partnering with "you" to keep our community safe.

While our community faced unique challenges due to Covid, your response and cooperation throughout the year helped all of us to pull through.

We had a great year, and I can't help but thank all of you for your continued support.

In closing, I would like to thank the Rangeley Fire Department, the entire Town Staff, NorthStar Ambulance, the Franklin County Sheriff's Department, and our local Border Patrol for their assistance throughout the year.

The services we provide are essential to a good quality of life for citizens and visitors alike. We take public services seriously, and we aim to keep our roads as safe as possible.

Our usual maintenance includes sweeping streets, ditching, painting of our parking spots and crosswalks, patching potholes, grading, keeping our trees trimmed back, cold patching, making sure our 3 plus miles of sidewalks are safe for pedestrians, plowing, sanding, and we also maintain our airport during all seasons. These are just a few things that the Public Works department does.

This past year, we started the Evergreen Cemetery project. M & H Construction came in to cut the lot (approximately 4 acres) and pile all the wood, then Cousineau's chipped it and hauled it off. The Public Works crew ground the stumps and hauled that material off. Several hundred yards of material was hauled in from different road projects. Please be patient as we move to the next step. We will continue the process this coming summer. The Loon Lake Road project is near completion, with a few minor things left to do, then final pavement can be placed.

As always, we will be doing more road work this year, so anyone that wishes to have material brought to your lot or home — please complete a fill permit at the Town Office and we will be happy to bring you some when we are in the area. The men in the Public Works departments are a great group and deserve a multitude of thanks! I want to take this time to thank my crew and other crews for all their hard work. This group of people makes my job a lot easier. I want to thank the taxpayers for all their support in the work we do

ANNUAL REPORT Rangeley Transfer Station for 2021

Dear Rangeley Residents,

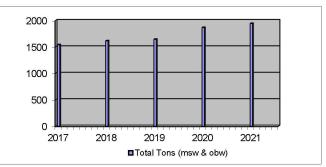
It's our 32nd year of operations at the Rangeley Region Transfer Station. I would like to thank both new and longtime residents for their support and participation of our programs and services.

We have three programs for keeping hazardous materials out of our waste stream.

- 1) the Universal Waste shed which collects mercury containing items like Rechargeable batteries, Fluorescent bulbs, Thermometers, and Thermostats. There is no charge for this so please recycle.
- 2) Recycling of computers, monitors, and TV's. This is MANDATORY BY LAW.
- 3) Our Household Hazardous Waste Day. This will NOT be held in Rangeley this year, but Rangeley/Dallas residents can bring their material to the Eustis/Stratton Transfer Station on June 11th, the Kingfield Transfer Station on July 9th, or the Mexico Region 9 School on August 6th.

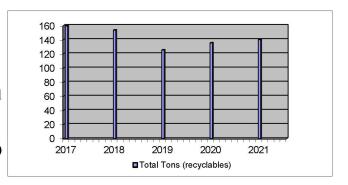
Household trash (msw) this year was 1484 tons (up 73 tons from last year), and Oversize Bulky Waste was 457 tons (up 1 ton). Tonnages continue to rise and with increasing costs, we are looking into ways to increase what we can recycle.

We also sent out 223 tons of shingles (down 23 tons), 147 tons of metal (up 2 tons), and 28 tons of tires (up 1 ton).



We recycled 140 tons (up 4 tons), and our average cost decreased to \$41.87/ton (down \$47) Materials that can be recycled are: (ask for flyer)

- 1) Cardboard: boxes/brown bags/juice cartons
- 2) Paper: magazines/catalogs/newspapers/junk mail
- 3) Plastic: #1-7/large rigid plastic/cups/jugs.
- 4) Metal: cans/pie plates/empty spray cans/foil (If Metal kept separate, it earns the Town money)
- 5) Glass: any color bottles and jars

Please don't waste the potential value of these resources. This was our fifth full year of zero-sort recycling and the response for it has been positive. We just ask you make sure it's recycle materials only. Thanks for your support. Our Household Hazardous Waste collection kept 420 gallons of toxic materials out of the landfill helping to keep Maine's groundwater safe, while the Bargain Barn kept 5.2 tons of re-usable items from being sent out as trash. We de-freonized 156 refridgerator/air-conditioners (down 27 units), and we still recycle used motor oil and used cooking oil.

I want to thank my co-worker Tom Watkin, attendants Roger Lowell and Carmen Steward. All the residents and businesses that reduce, reuse, and recycle. The Highway Crew who keep the roads open and sanded in the winter. The Rangeley School personnel who help keep the entire school recycling and Public Works director Keith Savage & Town Manager Joe Roach for their support.

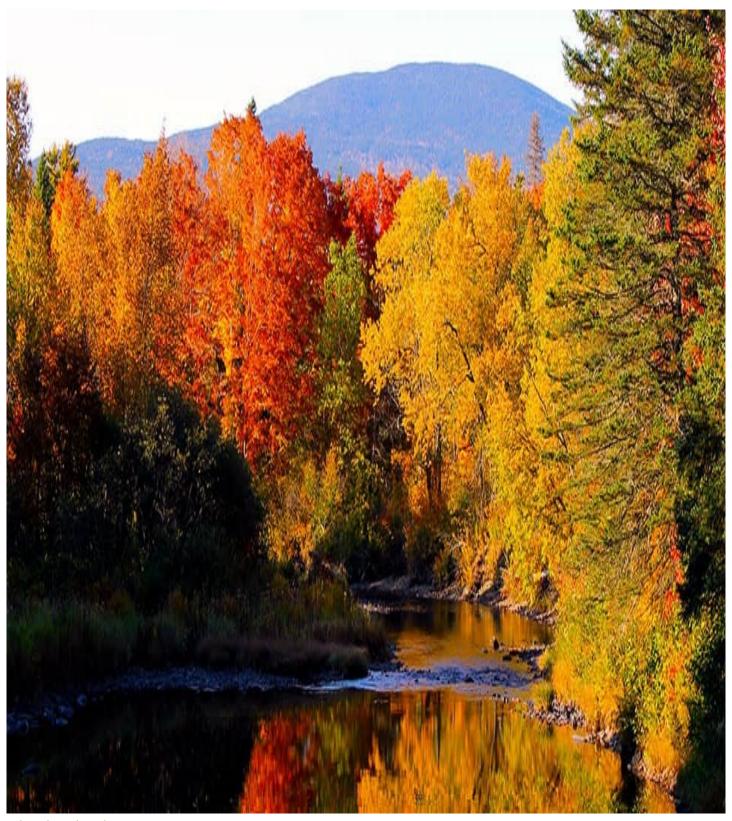

Dear friends at the Town of Rangeley,

I write on behalf of Safe Voices to request funding support from the Town of Rangeley. Safe Voices is the only domestic violence and sex trafficking and exploitation resource center serving Androscoggin, Oxford, and Franklin counties. We write to you with the hope that the Town of Rangeley will assist us in reaching our communities and ensuring that resources are available by providing funding to our work.

Safe Voices has served residents of the Town of Rangeley through diverse advocacy services for survivors of domestic abuse and violence for 45 years. In the last year we provided support and safety planning to 953 individuals throughout our catchment area. At our shelters, we safely housed 78 adults and 37 children. We offer **free and confidential services** for everyone we work with, with the exception of our Violence Intervention Program for those who use abusive behaviors in their relationships.

This year we are requesting \$500 from the Town of Rangeley in order to continue this vital work and provide the following services to residents:

- A 24-hour Helpline for survivors, service providers, and others affected by domestic violence
- A 17-bed emergency shelter and six-bed safe house for survivors of sex trafficking and exploitation
- Transitional services, including housing navigation to assist survivors on attaining safe, stable housing
- Rural outreach programs: Advocacy, support and referral services in offices located in Lewiston, Farmington, South Paris, and Rumford
- Court advocacy: Assistance and support with criminal and civil proceedings
- Education groups for those who batter: The Violence Intervention Program is a 48-week program certified by the Maine Dept. of Corrections
- Community prevention and education provided in all three counties

Dear Joe.

Mainers have always been known for their courage, creativity, grit, and willingness to help a friend or neighbor in need. The past eighteen months have challenged us all in many ways, but together we have remained steadfast to these qualities that make Maine "the way life should be." From all of us at LifeFlight of Maine, thank you for doing your part to keep Maine strong and connected. Your past gift to LifeFlight is a vital signal about the importance of the service we provide to those in your community, as well as Mainers across the state. As a non-profit organization, we rely on the support of many types of donors to support our mission. We hope you will consider a gift again this year.

The reach and relevance of LifeFlight is stronger than ever before. It has been an extraordinarily busy and challenging year to deliver the lifesaving care and transport that is only available from LifeFlight. Since March 2020, we have cared for 1,535 positive (or presumed positive) COVID-19 patients. In August, we transported our 32,000th patient since our founding in 1998. That same month, we averaged eight transports each day, a 25% increase over the normal average of approximately six transports per day. These transports include Mainers of all ages, from newborn to young adult to seniors; from all points of Maine from York to Presque Isle and everywhere in between. Imagine the ripple effect that has on families, friends, generations, and communities. Most importantly, LifeFlight cares for every patient regardless of insurance or financial status.

Since 1998, 98 residents of Rangeley have been cared for by LifeFlight, with 3 in the past year. In addition, LifeFlight has made 109 scene calls to your community to support local fire/rescue and EMS partners.

We rely on Maine communities like Rangeley to ensure that all Mainers have access to critical care and medical transport when they need it, 24/7/365. Last year, 184 towns supported LifeFlight for a total of \$113,876. This year we need these communities, and more, to come together so we can reach our goal of raising \$125,000. Will Rangeley once again support LifeFlight with a gift of \$2,000?

The funds raised will help provide education and training to our crews and EMS/Fire agencies around the state, upgrade and replace medical equipment, enhance Maine's aviation infrastructure, and bring a third, new critical care helicopter to Maine in 2022.

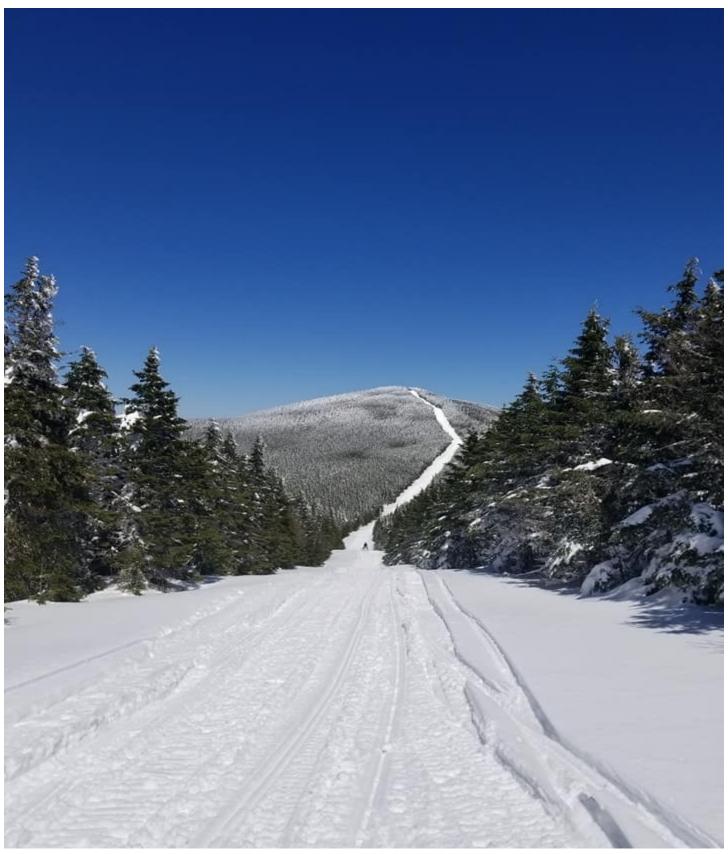

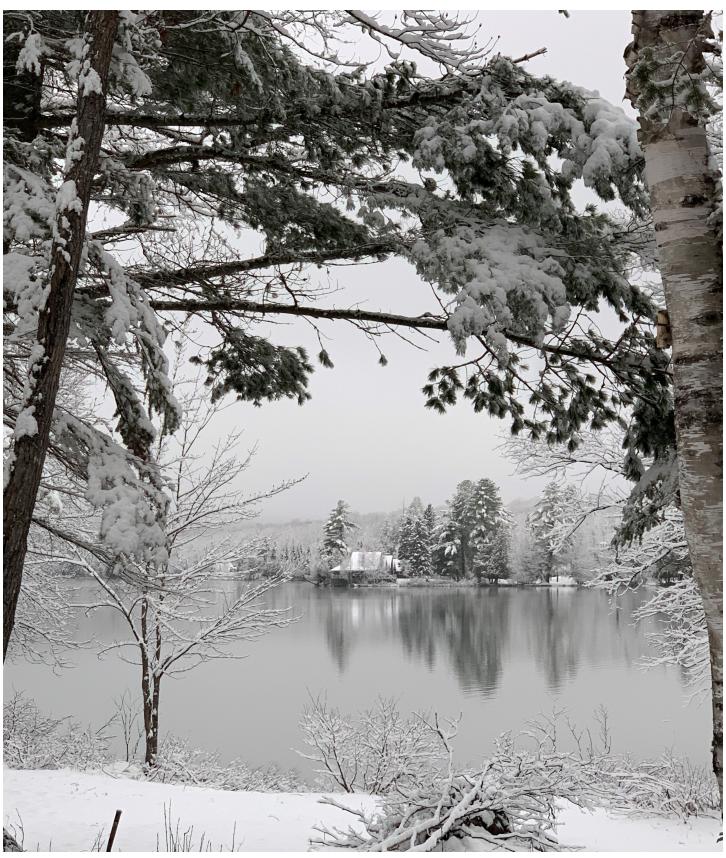

Rangeley received a total of \$121,986.26 (installed in two payments of \$60,993.13 each). This article would give a **one-time** payment of \$1.00 per hour to essential full-time employees for each hour worked in a public setting. This does not include hours worked from home, vacation time or sick leave.

Article B23 (Page 4 of Warrant) - Rangeley Fire Rescue is requesting to replace their 27 year old Engine 3 which is currently out of NFPA standard with a new Engine totaling \$747,663. RFR is requesting to enter a seven year lease where the yearly amount would be approximately \$43,908 which is planned to come from an amount already placed into reserves yearly. Rangeley is responsible for 49% of the cost of the apparatus with the rest being billed out to the Plantations as well as the County Commissioners of Oxford and Franklin Counties. The new apparatus would be built specifically for Rangeley and would include a pump under cab, Tak-4 suspension and galvanized frame and components to name a few. The life of this apparatus would be estimated at 25 years.
